Workshop Contributes to Career Fair Success

The week before the annual University of Kansas School of Journalism and Mass Communications career fair in early March, I hosted two hour-long workshop sessions on separate days to better prepare students. Before the workshop, most of the J-School students thought career fairs were a place to dress sharp, randomly make the rounds to all the booths, drop off resumes, pick up business cards and collect giveaway items.

I encouraged students to think more strategically about their approach to the fair and focus on maximizing their limited time by targeting organizations that interested them the most. During the preparatory sessions, we emphasized the importance of being confident in their introduction, how to present resumes to prospective employers, research the organizations and the proper questions to ask in a small timeframe to keep the conversation going. At the end of each session, I presented an actual internship description of one of the companies looking to hire the students and asked for volunteers to participate in a mock career fair. I served as a representative for a company recruiting interns, and students eagerly stepped up to serve as the prospective intern. It was extremely well received and the students who participated were confident in their approach.

"In a five-minute conversation, you can get an impression of the company, the company's culture and see if the company seems like a good fit for you," said Katie Stone, a KU graduate who interned with InTouch Solutions, a company she now represents at career fairs as an associate analyst in social media. "It's a great way to get an in-person impression about companies that you've read about online."

The turnout for the career fair was fantastic with 187 students and 30 vendors, and I believe the workshops contributed to the success. Holding it the week before the fair was perfect timing. By then, I knew all of the organizations registered and was able to provide the students links to their websites to research. The perfect scenario that emerged: A student attended the workshop, connected with an organization at the career fair, applied for a summer internship, participated in a mock interview in my office and two days later was notified she had been selected as an intern.

If you haven't already, I highly recommend organizing a mock job fair to promote your actual career fairs and help your students make the most of the opportunity.

**The President's Scholarship 2015
AAEE's 82nd Annual Conference**

I would like to express my appreciation to you, the members of KACE, for the President's Scholarship, which allowed me to attend the 82nd Annual AAEE National Conference last November in San Antonio, Texas. The American Association for Employment in Education invites career services professionals who work with education students and school human resources personnel to membership.

Some of you may know AAEE for its *Job Search Handbook for Educators*, which is published annually. It continues to be an excellent resource for teachers and pre-services professionals engaged in the job search. Articles run the gamut of job search resources, from résumés and interviews to international teaching and alternatives to the classroom. Many member institutions purchase the *Handbook* to distribute to student teachers each year.

For a time, I was quite involved in AAEE, having served on its Board of Directors for four years and two years on the now-defunct Senate. During that time, AAEE was suffering from some rather inept management, along with financial difficulties as a result of declining membership. As you all know, as budgets for both PK-12 and higher education suffered, an easy place to cut back was professional memberships. AAEE, as a targeted and somewhat secondary organization for career services offices and human resources professionals, endured the difficulties and seems to have emerged as a somewhat stronger and renewed organization.

Though the conference now runs only Sunday night through Tuesday morning, it was encouraging to see higher attendance and better programs than the last time I had attended a few years ago. I believe the association has re-found its footing. I'd like to share a couple of highlights.

The keynote speaker for the conference was Dr. Cinthia Salinas, Associate Professor of Education at the University of Texas at Austin. Her talk, "Tomorrow's Classroom: What If We Could Prepare Teachers for a Culturally and Linguistically Rich Community of Learners?" was an engaging and enlightening session focusing on multiculturalism. Using her own experiences as a Hispanic American growing up and seeking education in Texas, as well as other situations where cultures have collided, we were led toward her "what if" proposition to the conclusion that we must make stronger efforts in teacher education to reach the goal of true multiculturalism in preparation and delivery.

The best breakout session that I attended was presented by Ralph Pruitt on the topic of international teaching. Mr. Pruitt is an international educator himself, now working with the International Schools Group (ISG) in Saudi Arabia. I have been to numerous sessions on international teaching over the years at multiple conferences, but Pruitt's nuts-and-bolts approach was the most practical I have heard.

Most of his presentation focused on international American schools, which generally require a bachelor's degree and a teaching license. As has been the case for many years, Pruitt recommends that students interested in teaching internationally attend the University of Northern Iowa Overseas Recruiting Fair, held annually in early February. Most of you have probably heard about this event or receive promotional materials from UNI. He also noted that teaching couples are usually preferred, but not required universally. Pruitt's own organization offers competitive salaries (\$40-58K plus signing bonus!), free housing, annual home leave, free utilities, and considerably more – pretty fascinating stuff to someone who spent the first half of his professional life in a classroom.

Just as with KACE and similar organizations combining both halves of the hiring equation, AAEE encourages networking among the members at the conferences. What fascinated me most about this conference was the mix of education employers attending, which had become very much a weakness of the organization recently. In addition to recruiters from public school districts ranging from Delaware to Louisiana to Alaska and points between, Christian schools, charters, and several international agencies were represented. It was a much broader scope than previous AAEE conferences that I attended several years ago.

The 83rd Annual AAEE National Conference will be held November 13-15, 2016, in Nashville, Tennessee. Though the conference is short, it does provide some excellent networking and professional development opportunities for education career services professionals and our school partners. Membership in the association allows for a discounted purchase price of the *Handbook* and lower conference registration fees.
