Highlight: KACE 2012 Conference Speakers

Phil Gardner, PhD, Director of Research,
Collegiate Employment Research Institute, Michigan State University
“Stargazing: Careers 2012 and Beyond”

Dr. Gardner is a nationally recognized researcher, speaker, and consultant on the transition from college to work. MSU’s annual college labor market study is completed under his direction each fall. His research is utilized by the National Association of Colleges and Employers, among other groups and organizations. Dr. Gardner’s presentation will be a highlight of the KACE Conference for both employers and career professionals.



Neeli Bendapudi, PhD, Dean, KU School of Business
“Becoming a Superstar: Building Your Personal Brand”

Neeli Bendapudi is a well-known speaker and researcher in marketing and branding. This presentation will be of interest to both employers and college career professionals. “The Discovery Voyage: Internships as a High-Impact Practice”

This presentation will focus on how universities are seeking innovative ways to enhance student engagement. Many are turning to high-impact practices like internships that appear to generate higher levels of student performance, learning, and development than traditional classroom experiences. This session will present results of a recent study examining internships that – when done well – result in meaningful outcomes for students, employers, and universities. Kerri Keller has over 20 years of experience in career services and has served as Director of Career and Employment Services at Kansas State University since 2003.

- Have helpful professional contacts in their corner during their job search (and beyond!)
